## NEW EXHIBITS AT THE INTERPRETIVE CENTER

The Six Mile Cypress Slough Preserve's new Interpretive Center is complete with informational and hands-on displays. Learn about otters, panthers, alligators and other animals that live at the Preserve. Listen to sounds that you might hear out on the trail...what are they? Be adventurous and guess what's in a box by just touching.

Many visitors are also curious about what the Slough looks like in our different seasons. See astounding photos of the difference between the wet season and the dry season taken from the same location. How do the animals adapt to these amazing, changing conditions?

Not only do the displays give information about the Preserve and its inhabitants, but there is information about the building itself.

It is the first public certified green building in Lee County. See if you can detect what makes the building green. (Hint: the ceiling is made of bamboo. This is a highly renewable resource.) Go on a mini-self guided tour and learn more.

The exhibit designer was Pattie Smith of Frina Design and the fabricator was ADM II studios in Tampa. Both companies worked extremely hard to get the project done in a very tight time frame.


### MEET THE FEBRUARY FRIENDS GATHERING SPEAKER

#### Monday, Feb 23rd at 7:00 PM

The guest speaker will be Scott Gregory from the Calusa Nature Center and Planetarium. Scott has been with the Calusa Nature Center and Planetarium since November, 2004 as a Resource Naturalist, leading its animal management programs.

Scott was born and raised in Milton Kevnes, England. He moved to the United States in 1993. He started his zoological career at Santa Fe Teaching Zoo, graduating in 2003 with a degree in Zoo Animal Technology, which led to a job with Wild Adventures, an animal conservation park, in Valdosta, Georgia. Scott was recruited by the Calusa Nature Center and Planetarium in November, 2004 for the position of Resource Naturalist, leading its animal management programs. Under his guidance, Calusa's animal collection has grown to over 100 animals and features such protected species as Bald Eagles, Indigo Snakes and gopher tortoises. Calusa's venomous snake collection was made possible after he arrived, as Scott holds all necessary permits for public exhibition of the species. He performs various public relations duties, appearing on television, radio and in print media, and holds daily presentations for the visiting public.

She also compared the data to her preliminary owl studies that began 22 years ago. Cindy is a Resource Teacher with the Environmental Education Program and a part time Avian Biologist for Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

### LEE COUNTY EXPANDS SIX MILE CYPRESS SLOUGH PRESERVE

Lee County added 19 acres to the Six Mile Cypress Slough Preserve December 5, 2008. The acquisition was funded by the Conservation 20/20 Program. The parcel is located in Fort Myers and it is attached to the eastern portion of the preserve just north of Colonial Blvd. Its acquisition will facilitate management.

The greatest environmental importance of this property is that it adds an upland buffer to a portion of the Preserve and retains an undisturbed sheet flow area that allows the Slough's flow way to expand and contract with the seasons without any man made constrictions like a berm. This property contains a cypress dome, pine flatwoods, wet flatwoods and wet prairie. The Conservation 20/20 program buys environmentally important lands for preservation. It's funded by a property tax, which was approved by referendum in 1996. It is 50 cents for every \$1,000 of taxable property value. With this purchase, the County's Conservation 20/20 program has made 95 land purchases and the land inventory now stands at 20,550 acres.


